2.40(b)(2) Direct

Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care (dealers and exhibitors).

* An adult female Cavalier King Charles Spaniel (microchip number 933320507149) has hair loss occurring along both sides of her body, on her rump, and on her tail. She was observed to be scratching at her sides. Skin conditions causing hair loss and itchiness such as this can include parasites, infections, or other medical problems. The licensee stated they have not consulted the attending veterinarian about this problem. The licensee must have this animal examined by a licensed veterinarian in order to ensure that an accurate diagnosis is obtained and that an appropriate treatment plan is developed and followed. The licensee must document the outcome of this consultation and make it available to the inspector upon request. Correct by noon on 23 May 2024.

2.75(a)(1) Repeat

Records: Dealers and exhibitors.

* There was no record of inventory for nine un-weaned puppies born at the facility.
* There was no record of inventory for 13 dogs approximately 6 months of age on the APHIS form 7005.
* Official identification (microchip) had not been recorded for two dogs on the APHIS form 7005.
Complete and accurate records are needed to ensure each animal's identity can be known with certainty and to facilitate the ability to trace dogs. The licensee must make, keep, and maintain records or forms which fully and correctly disclose the complete required information concerning each dog purchased or otherwise acquired, owned, held, or otherwise in his or her possession or under his or her control, or which is transported, euthanized, sold, or otherwise disposed of by that dealer or exhibitor. The records shall include any offspring born of any animal while in his or her possession or under his or her control.

2.134(a)

Contingency planning.

* No contingency plan was available for review during the inspection. The contingency plan describes what will happen to the dogs if an emergency or natural disaster happens. It also lists all contact numbers that could assist the licensee when an emergency or natural disaster happens. The licensee must develop, document, and follow an appropriate plan to provide for the humane handling, treatment, transportation, housing, and care of their animals in the event of an emergency or disaster (one which could reasonably be anticipated and expected to be detrimental to the good health and well-being of the animals in their possession. 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3.1(c)(2)

Housing facilities, general.

* Carpet squares in two enclosures were worn and unraveling along the edges resulting in long strings. Fourteen dogs are in contact with the affected surfaces located in sheltered housing. The frayed carpet edges and/or loose carpet fibers could increase the risk of an animal getting entangled, increase the risk of ingestion of a foreign body and/or other injury. The licensee must ensure all surfaces must be maintained on a regular basis. Surfaces of housing facilities that cannot be readily cleaned and sanitized, must be replaced when worn or soiled. Correct by 6/5/24.

3.1(e)

Housing facilities, general.

* Dog food was being stored in an open top container. Uncovered dog food could potentially become contaminated by pests such as flies and mice. Consuming contaminated food could have a negative impact on the health of the dogs. The licensee must store all supplies of food must be stored in a manner that protects them from spoilage, vermin infestation and contamination. All open food must be stored in a leak proof container with a tightly fitted lids to prevent contamination and spoilage. Correct by 5/28/24.

3.3(c)

Sheltered housing facilities.

* No lighting (artificial) was available for routine inspection of the sheltered building and the natural light entering through the door was insufficient to evaluate the interior of the building. Insufficient lighting decreases the ability of the licensee to conduct good housekeeping practices and adequate inspection of the dogs. The licensee must ensure that lighting is uniformly diffused throughout animal facilities and provide sufficient illumination to aid in maintaining good housekeeping practices, adequate cleaning, adequate inspection of animals, and for the well-being of the animals. Correct by 6/5/24.

3.6(a)(2)(iii)

Primary enclosures.

* One small white dog was observed laying on top of the enclosure fencing during the inspection. The top of the enclosure fencing was estimated to be three feet tall. The dog then jumped from the top of the enclosure to the ground outside its enclosure. Because this primary enclosure cannot contain this dog, the potential for injury exists both from the jump to the ground and from being uncontained. The licensee must ensure that primary enclosures must be constructed and maintained so that they contain the dogs securely. Correct by end of business 5/23/24.

3.8

Repeat

Exercise for dogs.

* Documentation of the program of exercise for 27 dogs was not available for review at the time of inspection. Exercise is necessary for the physical health and well-being of the dogs. The exercise plan ensures that whatever the licensee is doing, whether that be floor space or other, is sufficient to meet the exercise needs of the dog. Failure to have a complete exercise plan does not ensure the exercise, space and psychological needs of the dogs are being addressed. The licensee must develop, document, and follow an appropriate plan to provide dogs with the opportunity for exercise. This plan must be approved by the attending veterinarian and be made available to APHIS upon request.

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3.11(a)

Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.

* An accumulation of fecal waste was observed in the outside portion of one enclosure in the sheltered whelp building. This enclosure housed one adult dog and her 4 puppies. The licensee stated she did not know when it was last spot cleaned. Odors, insects, disease hazards, and pest infestation from fecal material accumulations can have an adverse effect on the health and well-being of the animals at this facility. The licensee must remove excreta and food waste from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors. Correct by 5/23/24.

3.11(c)

Repeat

Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.

* Cobwebs and dust were observed accumulating on the interior walls and on the welded wire attached to the metal enclosure gate frame located in the whelp building. Fourteen adult dogs are in contact with the affected surfaces located in sheltered housing. This indicates a living area exists for rodents, other pests, and vermin. Unsanitary living conditions are created if the affected area is not kept clean. This could lead to health issues for the animals. The licensee must ensure that all buildings and surrounding grounds must be kept clean and in good repair to protect the animals from injury, to facilitate the prescribed husbandry practices required in this sub part, and to reduce or eliminate breeding and living areas for rodents and other pests and vermin.

3.13(a)

Repeat

Veterinary care for dogs.

* Documentation of the written program of veterinary care was not available at the time of inspection. The program of veterinary care is a required written agreement between the licensee and the attending veterinarian. Formal arrangements shall include regularly scheduled visits to the premise of the licensee. The program of veterinarian care establishes standards of care for the animals. A completed written program of veterinary care is important for the care of the animals and ensures clear and accurate communication between the facility and the attending veterinarian. The licensee must have a completed program of veterinary care available for review during inspections.

3.13(a)(2)

Repeat

Veterinary care for dogs.

* Documentation of the last recorded physical examination of the dogs was not provided for review at the time of inspection. Physical examination of every dog on the premise is necessary to evaluate each dog for its health and physical body condition. In addition, the physical examination evaluates the overall condition and health of the hair coat, feet, ears, and eyes. The licensee must have a complete physical examination from head to tail of each dog by the attending veterinarian not less than once every 12 months.

3.13(b)(2)

Veterinary care for dogs.

* No medical records were made available during the inspection for one adult female Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, with microchip 933320507149, who has hair loss . The licensee stated that the dog has a reoccurring loss of hair. Medical

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records are necessary for the licensee to document medical problems over time and the treatments being given for the problem. The licensee must keep copies of medical records for dogs and make the records available for APHIS inspection. These records must include all problems identified (such as a disease, injury, or illness), the date and a description of the problem, examination findings, test results, plan for treatment and care, and treatment procedures performed, when appropriate. Correct by 6/5/24.

3.13(b)(3)

Veterinary care for dogs.

* Documentation of the last recorded date for all vaccinations and other treatments such as deworming medication was not available for review at the time of inspection. Complete and correct medical records allow the licensee and the attending veterinarian to ensure that directions from the attending veterinarian for medical care are being followed and that treatments are being administered correctly. The licensee must keep copies of medical records for dogs and make the records available for APHIS inspection. These records must include the names of all vaccines and treatments administered and the dates of administration To be corrected by 6/5/2024.
