When the inspectors were looking at the enclosure housing the two Lasha Apsos they noticed that the male (Cash, approximately 10 years old microchip ending in 2837) was scooting his butt and whimpering as well as trying to bite at his rear end. When asked to look at him the inspector noticed a big fecal/hair ball the size of a baseball ball hanging from his anus. There was also a fecal/hair ball the size of a golf ball hanging in front of his anus where the only way to visualize his anus was to physically lift away the fecal/hair ball. Upon looking at the anus the inspector noticed it was very red and inflamed. Poor coat care can lead to matting close to the skin such as the collection of fecal material which can lead to pain, discomfort and have a negative impact on the animal's well-being. The licensee must have this dog evaluated by a licensed veterinarian for an accurate diagnosis and to establish an effective treatment plan. The licensee must ensure all dogs receive adequate veterinary care at all times.

3.1(a)

Housing facilities, general.

When starting the inspection, the inspectors noticed a Dachshund (Kye, approximately 2-year-old male with microchip ending in 6113) that was loose behind the first enclosure they were looking at. One of the inspectors asked the licensee if she was out last time to which the licensee told them no, she had dug out of her enclosure yesterday morning. The licensee also stated that he had put concrete blocks in front of the hole in the enclosure and they were in the process of catching her. Enclosures that don't contain animals can impact the heath and well-being of the animal, can cause injury and potentially lead to death. The licensee must ensure that the enclosures for all dogs are kept in good repair and contain the animals securely.
