Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care (dealers and exhibitors).

The licensee has recently acquired an adult female Bichon and does not have the necessary equipment to groom this dog. The dog has heavily matted fur on all four legs and tail. The licensee stated that she plans to groom the dog and will acquire the necessary equipment to do so in the next few days. This breed of dog requires regular grooming, and although recently acquired by the licensee, the dog appears to not have been groomed for several months. Having the appropriate equipment to conduct regular grooming is important to allow daily observation of the dogs and to maintain their skin and coat health. The licensee must acquire the necessary equipment to provide appropriate grooming for all the breeds present at the facility.

3.10(a)

Watering

In one enclosure housing 3 adult dogs there is an overturned water bowl and no other access to potable water provided. The licensee stated that the bowl has to be filled multiple times because the dogs overturn the water frequently. Dogs that do not have access to water may experience thirst or become dehydrated. The licensee need to provide continuous access to potable water.

3.11(a)

Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.

The sheltered portion of one primary primary enclosure housing three adult dogs is heavily contaminated with fecal material. The fecal material has been flattened and smeared across the floor when the dogs walk through it and covers approximately 80% of the floor. Failure to provide adequate cleaning and sanitization in the primary enclosures increases the risk of disease transmission, attracts insects/pests, and increases odors. Excreta could potentially cause soiling on the body of the dog being housed in the affected enclosure. The licensee must remove excreta and food waste from the primary enclosure daily and from under the primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors.
